SUNDAY SCHOOL ROOM Update -

Phase 1 - the new thatch, was completed in December. This allowed me to claim the outstanding grant monies (£14,000), these were received in January.

On Thursday 2 January the Coffee Stop equipment was moved into the church and on Friday 3 January a great team of 14 volunteers moved the tables, chairs, etc to Ballarat for safekeeping - a big thank you to the team and to Seamus the van man! Phase 2 - the floor replacement, commenced the following week. The extent of the decay to the old timbers was significant. An inscription with the name "D E Pittard 196?", etched in cement, was found under the floor! The floor replacement will be followed in March by Phase 3, the installation of a new kitchen. Jean Morton and Belinda Bezance have done a sterling job and devoted much time to the design and the appliances for the new kitchen. The design was presented to the PCC at it's January meeting and was unanimously approved. New infrared heating was also approved and the project group is now reviewing lighting and other possible enhancements.

A number of items, a fridge, small oven, microwave, hob, etc are now redundant. Anyone wishing to give them a new home please contact me - donations welcome.

Four Lopen stalwarts currently mow the churchyard grass to keep it looking tidy. We now have one vacancy, applications invited!

What you may have missed...

Hopefully residents will be pleased to see the completion of works at the wooded footpath at the end of Rydon Lane.

After over 18 months of deep mud along an increasing distance on the footpath, where even summer use of the path proving difficult this year, the long-term correspondence and site visits undertaken by Cllr Feeney and the Clerk with Somerset Council have paid off. The new Rights of Way Officer for Somerset Council has proved really helpful and proactive and a team of workers arrived in the first week of January to dig out mud, lay french drains, install shuttering and fill the path with aggregate/chippings.

If you haven't yet seen the new path, see the photos here for the transformation. The team also cut a way through the large fallen tree further up the route.

Next step - we're working towards a kissing gate nearby where there are two broken stiles at the two orchard junction heading towards Over Stratton. However, due to recent restructuring at Somerset Council there are now only four ROW Officers for the whole of Somerset and budgets are more than strained, so fingers are very much crossed.

In addition blankets, sleeping bags, tents, unopened hygiene and toiletries are always requested, and now large suitcases. From April summer clothing and footwear will be required.

I began by writing 'a little from everyone' and I wish to emphasise this. Whatever you can donate will be really appreciated by those who receive them, for practical reasons obviously, but equally importantly, they will know the world has not forgotten them.

Rainfall report 14 January 2025 Jeremy Rook

December 2024 was a relatively dry month - I recorded 39 mm of rain against my Long Term Average (LTA) of 103 mm. it was the first under-average month since August.

For the calendar year of 2024, we had 1,047 mm as against the LTA of 902 mm – the sixth wettest year since I started recording here in 1997.

So far in January we have had 62 mm against the LTA of 89 mm for the whole of January.

It is pleasant to have a dry spell but Winter rainfall is very important for the country as a whole – especially the South East of England which has the lowest annual average rain and a large and growing population.

Taking England alone its population has grown from 46 million in 1976 to nearly 58 million in 2024 (figures from the Office for National Statistics). During the intervening years we have luckily not experienced a severe drought as we did in 1976, but there has not been much addition to our water storage either. Luckily for us in Somerset we have many fewer people and we have large aquifers which store the water underground where it will not evaporate in hot weather.



Volunteers finish 5-year Roman mosaic endeavour

A team in Somerset used period-accurate tools to produce 140,000-piece flooring at a replica villa, despite an absence of formal archaeological training Volunteers have worked for five years to create a Roman mosaic floor using original methods, tools and techniques

Every Wednesday half a dozen volunteers meet in a reconstructed Roman villa on Somerset's marshes to work on a colourful 140,000-piece mosaic. Kneeling on the floor of a large dining room, they carefully place small stone and tile cubes, known as tesserae, in lime mortar to create geometric shapes and animal motifs.

After five years, the volunteers at Avalon Archaeology, a site with reproductions of local historical buildings run by the South West Heritage Trust (SWHT) near Glastonbury, laid the last stones to complete the project this

winter.



Richard Brunning, 58, the project lead and senior archaeologist at SWHT, said: "We believe it is the only recreation of a Roman mosaic in the UK made entirely by untrained volunteers, using the same materials and techniques as the Romans did.

"The finished result is a great testament to the dedication of the volunteers, who have produced a great work of art despite having no prior experience." Somerset is home to some of England's grandest Roman villas, which are rural homes of the nobility often adorned with frescoes and mosaics that were built in the late Roman period when money and wealth poured into the region. So once the villa at Avalon Archaeology was completed by volunteers in 2019, Brunning wanted to add an authentic mosaic to evoke a similar sense of prosperity.

For the design he chose a mainly geometric pattern excavated at Hurcot, near Somerton, filling any blank spots with additional elements including fish, a dolphin and an elephant found at Whatley, Newton St Loe and **Lopen.**

Over the next two years two dozen volunteers spent hours hand-making 140,000 tesserae using regional white, blue and grey lias, yellow Doulting stone

and reclaimed red tiles.



Martin Day, 69, estimated he made about 30,000 of them, spending much of the Covid lockdowns in his garage using the traditional hammer and hardie, a chisel set upright in a block of wood, to get square cubes of about 13mm.

He said: "I think it was very important that we did the whole thing with local materials in exactly the way the Romans did. None of the mosaics that we used for our design are actually accessible to the public so it gives local people the opportunity to see the designs the Romans used in Somerset."

Once the tesserae were ready, a rotation of between two and five people met each Wednesday to lay the mosaic, small sections at a time, starting with a solid black border on the outside before advancing to more complicated guilloche patterns and animal motifs. Wendy Murray, 65, said: "The mosaic laying is a challenge, it's like a jigsaw puzzle. At least we do have the box, so to speak, we have the design and the basic shapes drawn out roughly in the mortar.

"Quite a few of us are not in our youth so kneeling down could be a bit of a problem. We were all complaining about our knees and the cold as well in winter, obviously there's no heating in the building so it could be rather cold."



Inevitably the untrained volunteers made the odd mistake throughout the three years it took but the group decided that if it was not noticeable from 5 feet away they would simply leave it, according to Leela Bunce, 44.

She said: "We worked so hard to do it as accurately as we can but what I love about it is that there is the odd little mistake here and there. That makes it even more authentic because if you look at any of the mosaics from Somerset and around the world there is always a little mistake. That is what I particularly love, it shouldn't be completely perfect because that makes it very human and very relatable." With only a handful of excavated Roman villas accessible to the public, Brunning hopes that the project at Avalon Archaeology will help visitors to imagine how Roman nobility would have lived in rural Somerset hundreds of years ago.

Brunning, who has been an archaeologist for three decades, added: "It's a lovely process as an archaeologist because you're translating the information from the holes in the ground into something real and tangible. I feel like I really fully understand the process now of Roman mosaics so when I'm excavating one I can truly appreciate what I'm excavating."
