Many will have heard my update at the Village Meeting on April 26th, when I covered funding, timescale and setting up an SSR group. The Lottery Fund came good in the end taking our total to £59,460. Now Christianne, Marian and the team have raised an amazing £1201 in the Lopen Plant Fair, taking us past the magic £60,000 mark. This latest contribution will go towards the replacement of one of the two decaying windows.

Some time ago we considered the installation of an audio/visual system, but there were greater priorities at the time. However the Platinum Jubilee Village Halls Fund was relaunched in February, so we have submitted an application for £4000 for such a system.

Although we have now achieved our target of £60,000, there will always be additional items such as better external lighting, improved acoustics, an effective hearing loop, redecoration and possible overruns - so in a word, please keep donating!!

On timescale, the floor will dictate the other items , and that in turn is dependent on the decision of the Planning Authority as the building is listed and so requires consent. And the good news is we have some users that have formed a group to pull together ideas for the SSR, and will meet for the first time at the end of May. **Steve Chapman, PCC Treasurer**

Bio-diversity and Environment in Lopen

Since January 2024, public authorities, including town and parish councils have a statutory Biodiversity duty under the 2021 Environment Act.



But did you know ...

- Somerset has lost over 5% of its total grassland habitats.
- Butterfly distribution has declined by over 330 square miles over 30 years
- Lapwing records have declined to worrying levels.
- The number of 'Good' quality rivers in Somerset has decreased.
- Non-native invasive species cover has increased by 260%.

Lopen already have the resident-run Eco Churchyard Group & Wilder Open Gardens operating in the village....

There is so much more that we can all do - if you have ideas, plans, curiosity or passion and/or already are involved in work, study or volunteering within this field, your knowledge could be valuable to the village and to nature.

Always look on the bright side...

Rainfall report 2nd May 2024 - Jeremy Rook

March and April this year have both been above average rainfall months, and in the year from 1st May 2023 to 30th April 2024 we have had only 2 months with below average rain – they were June last year and January this year. On a rolling 12 months, I have recorded nearly 1,200 mm compared with the Long Term Average of about 900 mm – so we have received about one third above LTA. This sort of overshoot has occurred 5 times in the 35 years I have been recording.

The wet Autumn and Spring has brought problems for farmers, making harvest difficult and expensive and delaying the sowing of crops. A lot of dairy farmers will be keeping their cows in Winter housing because their hooves will destroy the pastures, trampling the grass into the mud. Back in Medieval times, a similar continuously wet year would have been disastrous for our ancestors, who lived a subsistence life, very dependent on each year's harvest. Several famines are recorded and in one just before the Black Death, the king and his followers arrived at St Albans only to find that there was literally no food to be bought – even for ready money!

How a local resident is managing the flooding - by Alex and Hasi Peto-Dias

We live in The Old Mill at the Merriott end of the village Our end of the village was badly flooded on Monday 4th December last year and the whole of our ground floor was destroyed. We have been living near Chard since then, waiting for the house to dry and 15 weeks later we have finally been given the green light to start restoration, which started this April. We hope to be back 'home' sometime in June.

Since the flooding, we have embarked on a programme of clearing and digging, re-routing channels & widening ditches in our fields to help take water away from the road and the village. One of our main projects has been to dig a huge pond quite near to the Lopen stream with the intention of catching and holding firstly a significant amount of water from excessive rainfall and secondly to hold water when the river bursts its' banks and over flows on to the village road.

Since we have lived in the village (about 20 years) we have always maintained and cleared the ditches around us and kept, wherever possible, the drains outside the house on the road free from debris and we hope other private land owners and farmers are doing the same. **Age UK Somerset** is looking for friendly people in our area who would like to get involved with making life happier for local older people.

As we get older, living alone and lacking the confidence or mobility to get out of the house can lead to anxiety, low mood and devasting loneliness (and as if that wasn't bad enough, this has been linked to an increase in health problems).

To solve these issues local charity Age UK Somerset have two wonderful free schemes running here - **Walk and Talk** which matches a volunteer with an older person for a weekly gentle walk and chat, and Wellbeing Friends where a volunteer visits each week to offer some friendly company.

However, they are desperate for volunteers to lend a hand and be matched with the older people they have on their waiting lists for both services.

Look Out - There's a SID about!

The Speed Indicator Device - SID - is back and reporting for duty. Thanks to Trevor Power, Ben Goldsmith, Mark Sullivan, Mark Lethbridge and Clinton Parker we now have a SID Crew working in rotation to move, charge and report on the village traffic antics.

It will be moved every 12-14 days, traffic/battery dependent, in 6 week cycles.Reports every 2 weeks from one of 6 different locations will be sent to the police via the Parish Clerk. Then we should start to see a more obvious police presence.



The two reports to date top line tells us the following:

Week 1 - 14-26 April 14,989 cars 'clocked' 72% were over the speed limit 5 people clocked over 90 mph 65% were between 40-50 MPH Week 2 - 26 April-11 May 15,826 cars 'clocked' 86% were over the speed limit 5 people clocked over 90 mph 50% were between 40-50 MPH
